# Edgehill Dinner

# 814 Naval Air Squadron -Royal Navy

2012 was a busy and most successful year for the "Flying Tigers". Led by Commander Chris

Stock Royal Navy, the Squadron has continued to exploit its anti-submarine and anti-surface warfare capabilities.

Operating six Merlin helicopters throughout the year, the Squadron has been involved with some major operations and exercises, most notably as a key element of the security plan for the summer's very successful Olympic Games. The Squadron conducted maritime force protection over Weymouth Bay, providing security for the sailing events in the area; operating from HMS BULWARK and RNAS Yeovilton with all six helicopters, the team worked tirelessly to ensure that the Games were a safe and secure spectacle for all to enjoy.

The Squadron also deployed in HMS ILLUSTRIOUS to the Mediterranean and Norway for various training exercises whilst maintaining their readiness to operate anywhere in the world at short notice; this required considerable dedication and commitment.

Currently preparing for a new phase of operations in the Middle-East, Squadron personnel maintain their enthusiasm and determination to conduct Maritime Operations as directed, whilst enjoying the opportunities the Fleet Air Arm and Naval Service have to offer.

## Visit to 101 Squadron at RAF Brize Norton

On a cold and blustery autumn day last year, the Master, Mistress, RAF Liaison Officer Air Commodore Paul Hughesdon and 15 Liverymen and guests enjoyed a splendid visit to No 101 Squadron, based at RAF Brize Norton in Oxfordshire. One of our three affiliated RAF units, the Squadron operates the VC10 aircraft and, at the time of visiting, was supporting operations in Afghanistan, the Falkland Islands and around the UK.

For an aircraft which has passed its 50th birthday that is, frankly, amazing! As usual, Wing Commander Kevin Brookes, the Squadron Commander, and his excellent team looked after us extremely well. We had the grand tour of a VC10, including a look at the internal tanks from which it pumps over fuel during air-to-air refuelling; it will be replaced by the AirTanker, an Airbus 330 variant which carries sufficient fuel for transfer without having to sacrifice passenger and freight capacity. We saw one of the heavy lift C-17 Globemasters, originally leased but now bought as part of the RAF transport capability, and a Hercules C130K – again a venerable and hardworking aircraft which has become a familiar and often very welcome sight across the world; it is due to be replaced, starting next year, by the larger and more capable A400M, again an Airbus Consortium design. Finally we visited the Air Traffic Control Tower. Over lunch we took the opportunity to chat with Squadron members and before departing met the Station Commander, Group Captain Steve Lushington. Overall an excellent and wide-ranging day. For 2013, we head to RAF Northolt and will be able to compare and contrast their operations.
