It was a stunning display of goldwork in so many styles and forms created by the most talented designers.

This is the third year that the Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers have awarded a prize for an entry featuring the best use of Goldwork at the Hand and Lock Annual Event at the Bishopsgate Institute for Hand Embroidery – Fashion and Textile Art and Wilcom Digital Embroidery.

Hand and Lock is London's oldest embroidery house and its Chairman, Alastair MacLeod, is particularly responsible for the Annual Prize Giving and Exhibition which took place in November 2018.

The Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers prize was this year awarded to Alex Standring, who also won the Student Category for Textile Art for producing a large sculptural Byzantine halo inspired Headdresses display, to represent the many transient emotions that people in the modern world experience.

The Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers Prize was presented by The Master, and Liverymen Elizabeth Elvin and Jean Scott-Moncrieff were on the Judging Panel.

The Master announced that he had purchased the winning entry from this year's Jewellery competition, a beautiful silver bowl created by student Kyosun Jung, which the



Master has now generously donated to the Company. The bowl was ceremoniously carried to the Master by the Clerk, with Kyosun Jung in attendance, and guests were able to appreciate the exquisite workmanship of this unique piece.

A most enjoyable evening ended with a traditional Stirrup Cup.

The Master also presented certificates to winners of the Company's annual prize, with Senior Aircraftsmen Shameem Kabir winning the 2018 award.

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

Kneller Hall – Royal Military School of Music

For his first visit of his Year, in late January, the Master Malcolm Craig, assisted by Fourth Warden Cynthia Fowler, arranged a visit by the Livery to the Royal Military School of Music at Kneller Hall, near Twickenham Rugby Stadium. We were told that this was an excellent time to visit the school as unfortunately Kneller Hall will close as a musical location in 2020 as the Ministry of Defence plans to move the whole school of musicians to another location.

Kneller Hall has a long history, first built in 1635 by Sir Godfrey Kneller, who was court painter to British Monarchs from Charles II to George I. He had the first building demolished and replaced by a new house reputedly designed by Sir Christopher Wren. In 1850 a new house was built in Jacobean style which is the current building. In 1857 the house and grounds was taken over by the War Office as a base for Army Bandsmen, and shortly after it became the Royal Military School of Music and Headquarters of the Corps of Army Music which it still is today.



A group of around 18 Liverymen and guests gathered on a bitterly cold afternoon at Kneller Hall where we first had a warming cup of coffee. We were taken on a very interesting tour of the Regimental Museum guided by the Curator Esther Mann. She showed us a wide range of musical memorabilia including blackened musical instruments captured from the Germans in World War 1 and several huge drums to be carried by marching soldiers.

We then progressed through the building to the beautiful small chapel on the first floor where the Chaplain of the RMSM, Padre David Loftus MBE lead us for a short service which included the Master reading the lesson from 1 Samuel 16 (David plays the Lyre for Saul) and an excellent organ recital by Bishop Richard Fenwick (Former Bishop of St Helena and current Hon Chaplain to the Company), also a superb organist. The works played were "Fantasia in C minor" by JS Bach, "Galliard for double organ" by John Bull, "Prelude no 1 and Priere from Vingt-quatre pieces" by Jean Langlais, and finishing with "La Beatitude" a jolly piece by Charles Piroye.

Everyone then made the short journey to the Marriott Hotel located within the rugby stadium where we all had an early supper, during which the Master presented a bottle of wine entitled "War Horse" to our host, Major Craig Hallett, the musical director of Kneller Hall, who had composed music for War Horse.

A fine day was had by all, but a somewhat chilly one!

Rugby Lunch Fundraiser for Blesma and Cardiac Risk in the Young charities

At lunchtime on the eve of the final weekend's matches of 6-Nations rugby, March 15th, nearly 300 liverymen and guests attended the first of two of the Master's major fundraising events.

Held in one of London's most iconic hotels, the Waldorf Hilton, attendees were welcomed in to the beautiful Palm Court - as featured in the 1953 film 'Titanic' - for a sumptuous drinks reception before lunch in the Adelphi Suite.

Prior to dining the Master welcomed the assembled Liverymen and Guests and thanked his sponsors and those donating auction prizes for their support. Special Guests included Operations Director, Ian Waller from Blesma, the limbless veterans charity, and Chairman, Dr Steve Cox from Cardiac Risk in Young (C-R-Y).

The Master's special guest was Major Pete Norton, GC. Pete spoke passionately about the support he received from Blesma following events in Iraq in 2005 where, as a Bomb Disposal Officer, whilst checking for Improvised Explosion Devices, a secondary victim-operated IED exploded. Pete lost an arm and his left leg in the explosion. He was awarded the George Cross for valour.

The C-R-Y chairman was supported by its Patron, Simon Halliday, ex Bath, Harlequins and England rugby international. The highlight of the afternoon was a most entertaining Q&A between host, Damian Hopley, ex-England rugby international, and Guest Speaker, Jason Leonard – England's most capped male rugby player. The "silent" and "live" auctions raised over £30,000 for these wonderful charities.

The Master presented our prizes at The Goldsmiths' Craft and Design Council Awards 2019 ceremony at Goldsmiths' Hall on 25th February to Teri Howes (Gold Award) and Filipa Oliveira (Silver Award) - Liga Thrower was also highly commended. Teri's work is beautifully hand worked in silver and gold using a crochet technique, while Filipa uses the ancient art of filigree. Liga has created a small loom to weave her unique bracelets.



The Company seeks to encourage and reward innovative design and making that incorporates original/actual wire (no casting) in all forms across jewellery.

The judges included Liverymen Jean Scott-Moncrieff and Elizabeth Elvin.

Freeman Bella Lane is founding an International Embroidery Centre and Museum in Peru. After graduating from The Royal School of Needlework in 2009 she has been waiting for the right opportunity to combine her love of traditional English embroidery with her Peruvian culture. She has now found a suitable site 10,000 feet up in the High Andes near Cusco, adjacent to the mystical 'Last Refuge of the Incas' where she and her team are due to start designing and building a traditional white-washed adobe building to house the museum.



And News from our Freemen

The 'Collect' International Art Fair for Modern Craft and Design was held in March at the Saatchi Gallery, London and featured work by some of our Freemen: Andrew Lamb, Lucie Gledhill, Nan Nan Liu represented by Bishopsland Educational Trust. Lucie is collaborating in experimental work making a hollow curb necklace by drawing silver wire into a gold tube, then constructing each link, then filing each link to expose the silver which is then dipped in nitric acid thus dissolving the silver and leaving the hollow gold link.



Freeman Laura Baverstock is a specialist costume embroiderer for films – some recent work includes Murder on the Orient Express, Mary Queen of Scots and The Aeronauts. She also designs and develops work for her own practice – the embroidered structures are created completely from gilt passing threads to create a 3D effect and the gold eyes of this magnificent lion are stitched with several different shades.





The Master attended Freeman Matt Powell's ceremony when he received his Freedom of the City of London. Past Master Tim Waller and Liveryman Jean Scott-Moncrieff visited the Bishopsland Educational Trust while Freemen Patrick Davison and Nan Nan Liu demonstrated various techniques to the post graduate students. They showed the processes involved in creating a length of precious metal wire - gold grains were heated in a crucible until they melted together and appeared to spin inside the crucible. Very carefully while still molten the metal was poured into an ingot former and allowed to cool. The resulting length of metal was painstakingly rolled through steel mills before being drawn through smaller and smaller holes in a drawplate to achieve a length of smooth wire ready for use.

Harriet Stiles (who is becoming a Freeman) graduated from the Royal School of Needlework and was then helped to set up her business through The Prince's Trust and Cockpit Arts. Both these organisations provide mentoring and business skills to graduates to help them get established. As well as working on her own embroidery business, Harriet is teaching embroidery skills to women in Saudi Arabia.

He also had a successful City career. Simon regaled us with some very amusing stories from his rugby career, to which the Master responded thanking him for his entertaining 'inside stories' from the world of high level rugby.

A Major Milestone in Plasma Donation



In April, Phil Egerton, a new Freeman of the Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers, completed a significant milestone by completing his 300th platelet and plasma donation at the Blood Donor Suite at Southampton General Hospital. Platelets and plasma, both golden in colour, are constituents of whole blood. Platelets are tiny cells, manufactured in the bone marrow which help to stop bleeding and platelet transfusions are a lifeline for patients who have low platelet levels as a result of illness such as cancer or leukaemia, major surgery, transplants or extensive blood loss. Unfortunately, platelets can only be stored for a few days and so regular donations are essential. One platelet donation can save the life of 3 adults or 12 children.

Plasma is the largest single component of blood and makes up about 55% of total blood volume. It is a clear, straw-coloured liquid, which carries platelets, red and white blood cells. It contains over 700 proteins and other substances, which can be extracted to become key ingredients in numerous lifesaving medical products.

Donation is straightforward, takes about 90 minutes at a specialist centre and is pain/ discomfort free apart from the slight discomfort when the needle is inserted. In each session Phil donates 2 units of platelets and one unit of plasma. As most of the blood is returned to the donor, platelet donors are able to donate every 2 weeks, unlike every 12-16 weeks for whole blood donors.

Unfortunately, only a few people have platelet counts high enough to enable donation and as a result NHSBT are urgently seeking new donors. Any blood group can donate but they especially need A negative and AB negative donors as their platelets can safely be given to patients with any blood group. As a result, these donors are extremely valuable and in constant high demand from hospitals.

Our Own Normandy Veteran – Keith Chapman

My father, Liveryman Keith Chapman, now 96 years old, was in 1944 a Second Lieutenant in the 30 Corp, Royal Corps of Signals.

Having just returned from active service in North Africa and Sicily with the Eighth Army, he was sent straight to the South Coast to prepare for the D-Day Invasion.

As second in command of 161 Section, consisting of 60 men, he left Gosport on 12th June 1944 in a landing ship arriving on Arromanches (Gold) Beach on the morning of the 13th and on to their main Corp HQ between Bayeaux and Caen.

From then on he was involved in laying lines of communication for the Battle of Normandy, including in the Bocage.

He then saw continued active service through France, Holland and Belgium, right through to the liberation of Brussels in February 1945 where he was one of the first allied troops to arrive in the city.

In November 2016 he was awarded the Legion d'Honneur at the French Embassy in London, by the Ambassador.

Court Decisions
